This year in Science we have introduced a new reading strategy in KS3 to help prepare the students to 'Read Like a Scientist'. Every half term students in Year 7, 8 and 9 are given a booklet that contains 3 different scientific journals. These are real journals, written by scientists for students and are selected to engage them in the subject, develop their scientific analytical skills and show them what careers science has to offer. The booklet makes it clear when each article is set and when it is due by.

Students have 2 weeks to read the assigned article and then answer the questions at the end of the article. They are encouraged to annotate the article, (a skill they learn in English) and watch any videos' online which will help them understand it better and help them answer the question. The website address is at the bottom of each article to access the online resources. We encourage you to read the articles with the students, highlight keywords and find the definitions, help them to describe graphs and what the results tell us and watch the video's with them.

This half term (Lent 2), the first article has been set this week and will be due the week commencing Monday 11th March. Please check your child's booklet/planner to see the exact date/lesson it is due. If your child loses their booklet, We have attached an electronic copy of the booklets to the bulletin. There are higher and lower reading levels so please select the correct one.

Meal Price Increase

The Trust and our catering partner Aspens wanted to inform you that effective from 4th March the meal price in our schools will increase to £2.80

The challenges we're seeing in our kitchens are the same as those you're likely experiencing at home. Ingredient prices are rocketing, and energy costs are sky high. Additionally, we're funding important National Minimum wage increases for the catering teams. Here is some background information that we would like to share with you.

As is the case for supermarkets and restaurants across the UK, we are experiencing weekly increases in the prices of food and drink, with the inflation of 12.2% in September and a further inflation of 6.7% in October according to the Office of National Statistics. Supply volumes have dropped, due to factors such as the invasion of Ukraine, bird flu, swine fever and extreme weather internationally, driving prices up. Aspens are working closely with our chefs and supply partners to introduce new products and dishes, along with driving the best deals we can but these mitigations have limits.

The Government is increasing the minimum wage by 9% in April. This is a positive move that will mean our teams are better able to address the cost pressures they are under, which is great progress, but does subsequently create funding pressures.

The situation is far from ideal, we would like as many students to enjoy our services as much as possible and we appreciate priceincreases make this harder, particularly when many families are feeling the effects of the general cost of living crisis. That said, we believe our food continues to offer excellent value for money against the £2.95 meal cost in the local authority schools.

As always, thank you for your support and understanding. We will continue to partner with schools, students and parents to explore new approaches and gain input and feedback as we navigate this challenging period.

TikTok

It has been brought to our attention that another Tik tok account has been created listed as St.bedes.wetties along with the previous account @littlemissstbedes. This has been found to have content shared involving some of our students and mostly in a negative way. Please speak with your child about this and encourage them to report the account so that it can be removed. If your child is identified as either following the account or being followed by the account, please ask them to unfollow or block.

As I am sure that you will appreciate this is an area of concern from a safeguarding aspect regards whom your children are accepting and following on social media also identifying their place of education. Therefore, we are asking that you as parents support the school by encouraging your child to remove themselves from the account associated within the next 48 hours. Anyone who is identified as still following or being followed after the 48 hours will be subject to appropriate sanctions within line to our school behaviour policy around acts of defiance.



Digital Leaders Focus of the Week - Bullying

1. Watch for behaviour changes

Children who experience bullying tend to change behaviour and may become more quiet or anxious and may ignore you from time to time. A shift of attitude towards existing friends or parents/carers could be a sign that your child is a victim to bullying.

2. Think things through

Before acting think to yourself if this is really bullying or just a big coincidence. Think about if this is the right time to report bullying. Jumping to conclusions may trigger your child and they might not want to open up to you.

3. Be open and understanding

Speak in a calming tone. This will encourage them to speak more openly and reveal more to you. Don't seem mad at them or they might not reveal anything. When they say they're "angry" do they mean frustrated or enraged. This will allow you to get through to them easier

4. Summarise your child's experience

Make sure you have summarised exactly what your child has said is right. Then report this information to the school so proper action can take place and we can sanction the perpetrator appropriately.
